Battle of Trenton December 26th, 1776

NEW YEARS DURING THE REVOLUTION

On New Year's Day 1777, Robert Morris wrote to George Washington and said: "The year 1776 is over, I am heartily glad of it and hope you nor America will ever be plagued with such another." While many of us have similar thoughts every New Year's about the previous year, the year 1776 was exceptionally bad for the patriot cause, despite the Declaration of Independence being signed that summer. After losing New York and a string of battles, Washington had shocked the world at Trenton on the day after Christmas. This glimmer of hope was almost crushed by the fact that most of his army's enlistments expired on January 1st.

Here is an excerpt about this pivotal moment from the book **Victory or Death** by Mark Maloy

"Washington's men had sacrificed much in the past few weeks and suffered greatly. Many believed they had done their duty, and rightly so. But at this moment, they were needed more than ever before. All day on December 31, 1776, Washington's generals appealed to the soldiers to reenlist. Washington authorized an exorbitant \$10 bounty to those men who agreed to remain, this being funded by financier Robert Morris in Philadelphia. Some of his generals, such as Gen. Thomas Mifflin, a politician and public speaker from Philadelphia, were successful in retaining some of the men, others were not as successful. However, the most affecting scene was when Washington himself personally appealed to the patriotism of the men who had campaigned by his side. Washington paraded Gen. John Sullivan's and Gen. Nathanael Greene's divisions just outside Trenton. He entreated the men to stay on just a few weeks more. He asked those who wished to reenlist to move forward, but at that point no one moved. Sergeant Nathaniel Root of the 20th Continental Regiment (Connecticut) remembered that the men were "worn down with fatigue and privation" and had their "hearts fixed on home." Washington, pleading with his brave soldiers wheeled his horse in front of the men and declared to them, "My brave fellows, you have done all I asked you to do, and more than could be reasonably expected; but your country is at stake, your wives, your houses and all that you hold dear. You have worn yourselves out with fatigues and hardships, but we know not how to spare you. If you will consent to stay only one month longer, you will render that service to the cause of liberty and to your country which you probably never can do under any other circumstances. The present is emphatically the crisis which is to decide our destiny." After considering their commander's words, more than two hundred of these men stepped forward to stay on and fight, and some of these men would be killed in the coming battles. The combination of patriotic pleas and hard currency helped persuade many more to stay. Washington retained a force of about 3,000 men from his army. These veterans would prove invaluable in the coming days."

Rob Ufford, a West Point graduate, and current chairman of the Chapter's Veterans Committee. Rob gave a very informative presentation on his topic, "Spy Techniques of the

Revolutionary War." George Washington, as commander of the Continental Army, estab-

lished a very innovative web of intelligence gathering. This included the use of ciphers and secret codes, as well as the masked letter, the use of invisible ink, the sending of ghost messages and the dissemination of disinformation about things such as troop strength, supplies, etc. Both the Americans



and British had female spies who would gather information about nearby forces.

President **Mark Anthony** thanked **Rob** for his presentation and presented him with a Certificate of Appreciation and the traditional \$2 bill that has become our custom. The \$2 Dollar Bill is the only legal tender that features an engraving of the *circa* 1818 painting *Declaration of Independence* by John Trumbull.

When the Revolutionary War came, the fighting did not necessarily break for the holiday, and soldiers were not exchanging gifts. Most famously, Christmas saw George Washington's crossing of the Delaware River and the attack on Trenton, New Jersey. Otherwise, fighting slowed during this time of year, not because of the holiday, but because of the weather. Joseph Plumb Martin, a Continental Army soldier who wrote a memoir

detailing his service throughout the war, noted Christmas' passing only as a means of giving a timeframe. No celebrations are mentioned.



Christmas was celebrated much differently in the 17th and 18th centuries than it has been in the 20th or 21st centuries. Even among those who celebrated it outwardly and joyously, it was still much more subdued than it is today. Gifts were typically reserved just for children and servants if given at all. While Christmas' religious meaning is still vital and is its most important aspect for so many, it still pales in comparison to the religious fervor attached to it in those early days of America. While some used religion to emphasize the day, others denounced it. It was marked by the firing of guns and church services. All of this is to say that Christmas mattered to many people in colonial and revolutionary America, but it was celebrated in a different way than it is today. There are certainly still some familiarities between the celebrations, but the

observation of the day has certainly developed over the centuries.

Vice President Stacey McCarver introduced the guest speaker, Compatriot Terry Manning. Terry gave an outstanding presentation of "The History of Santa Claus since 1776" Tracing the origins and evolution of the story of



In Memoriam Compatriots who passed away in 2022

These men were our friends, compatriots, veterans, family members, and loved by many. They all shared a dedication and love for the Sons of the American Revolution. They will be missed, but not forgotten.



Joe Zimmerman

Joe was an active member of Sons of the American Revolution and participated in many of their activities and research projects. He was also extremely involved in family and community genealogy and was truly the family "historian". That family history telling will be sadly missed because he loved family and all the family connections. But his genealogy went far beyond family because he was also involved in many communities and also did searches for other families. He gave of his time generously to help research various projects, especially where his relatives originally settled many years ago. He was actively involved in Beavercreek, Ohio Historical Society where the small town of Zimmerman, Ohio once existed. He has a display of Zimmerman family items at their location. He also was a key historian for the Christiansburg community, his boyhood home, as well as many other communities.



Joe Vancura

Even though Joe was not a member of the Piedmont Chapter, in fact he was a member of the John Collins Chapter, he was the 2022 GASSAR President. After presiding over the 132nd congress hosted by the Georgia Society, a project Joe worked tirelessly on and was so proud of, Compatriot Vancura unexpectedly passed away. In addition to his leadership role as the GASSAR State President, he served many other positions both at the state level and at the chapter level. Mr. Vancura was a Chapter Charter Member of Captain John Collins and a Life member of the National Society. In addition to his academic accomplishments, workplace achievements, and love for history through his service in the Sons of the American Revolution, Joe enjoyed travel, music, and live theater. He often advised his friends to just attend their local theater, sit back and enjoy a live play.



Bob Allgood

Bob was born Robert Hanks Allgood on December 15, 1925 in Opelika, AL. He was the youngest of three sons born to Earnest and Eleanor Allgood. He grew up in Lee county. AL and attended Lee County High School in Auburn, AL, graduating in 1943. Bob entered Auburn University in September 1943. While a student at Auburn he volunteered for service in the U.S. Army Air Corps on November 27, 1943 and was placed in the Enlisted Reserve Corps at 17 year of age. Following his 18th birthday he was ordered to active duty on March 20, 1944 and was inducted into the Air Corps at Ft. McPherson, GA. He reentered Auburn University in June of 1946 to pursue a degree in Civil Engineering, which he received in August 1949. While seeking answers to queries from his grandson Neal, who was seeking information about family ancestry needed to complete a writing assignment for a high school subject, Bob learned that he was descended from a patriot ancestor through Joel Dean, Sr. and his wife, Mary Brockman, whose father, John Brockman, was a Revolutionary War patriot. Bob became a member of SAR and of Piedmont Chapter August 31, 2005 and served as Chapter Historian for many years.







The Fund is in honor of **General Nathanael Greene**, who was instrumental in recapturing the South from the British in the Revolutionary War, and who lived in Georgia after the war and is buried near Savannah. (See story on next page)

Any member of the SAR, friends, relatives, spouses, or other individuals, living or deceased, having an interest in furthering the goals of the Piedmont Chapter, or that are being recognized or memorialized, may become a member the Fund with a contribution being made in their name for the required minimum amount. Those who are so named shall be designated a "Piedmont Fellow" and be awarded the distinctive "Piedmont Fellow Fund" pin which identifies them as a "Piedmont Fellow."




General Nathanael Greene takes over the Southern Department

On this day in history, December 3, 1780, General Nathanael Greene takes over the Southern Department of the Continental Army after the Americans suffered a string of defeats in the southern states. General Robert Howe lost the city of Savannah, Georgia; General Benjamin Lincoln lost the city of Charleston, South Carolina with over 5,000 soldiers; and in August, 1780, General Horatio Gates' army was destroyed at Camden, South Carolina with almost 2,000 men killed or captured. These losses left South Carolina and Georgia completely in British hands. British General Charles Cornwallis then turned his sights on North Carolina and his ultimate goal, Virginia. After these defeats, morale was at an all-time low in the southern colonies. There was virtually no army remaining. Congress needed to turn something around before the South was completely lost.

Congress had bypassed George Washington's authority by appointing all three failed generals in the South. This time, they deferred to Washington's judgment as Commander-in-Chief, who immediately selected General Nathanael Greene to take over. Greene had already proved himself in battles at Trenton, Brandywine, Germantown, Monmouth and Newport and had shown an enormous talent for organizing and logistics as Quartermaster General at Valley Forge. Nathanael Greene was the owner of a



foundry in Coventry, Rhode Island and had trained himself in the art of war through books. He was appointed a Major General in Rhode Island at the outbreak of the war and soon became a Brigadier General in the Continental Army, becoming one of Washington's most trusted advisers.



Greene took charge of the Southern Department at Charlotte, North Carolina on December 3, 1780 and things immediately began to turn around. Greene first concentrated on rebuilding the forces with the help of his legendary organizational skills and ability to procure supplies and garner local support. He began making strikes against Cornwallis, but would pull back and outrun the British pursuers, often using swollen rivers to keep distance between them. Cornwallis' army began to wear out as Greene drew them further inland, away from their supply depots on the coast. Greene gathered all the forces he could to Guilford Courthouse in Greensboro, North Carolina and fought a battle there that was extremely costly to the British, who were forced to return to their base at Wilmington on the sea. Cornwallis decided to abandon his attempt to conquer North Carolina and he turned north to Virginia instead, setting up the surrender at Yorktown less than one vear later.

Rather than follow Cornwallis into Virginia, General Greene turned south and aided the local militias in driving

the British back from the interior toward the sea. By the time the Treaty of Paris was signed to end the war, only a few southern coastal cities remained in British hands. The remainder of their territory was securely in American hands.

General Nathanael Greene is usually regarded as the most talented military mind of the American Revolution after George Washington, even though he never won a single decisive victory. All the major battles he fought in the South were draws. However, his strategy of dividing and weakening the British lines, separating them from their supply lines and forcing them to a chase on long marches eventually wore them out and returned the South safely into American hands. Nathanael Greene is truly one of the great geniuses and heroes of the American Revolution and deserves all the praise he usually receives.


