

Message From President Stacey McCarver (continued)

In the Piedmont Chapter, we will celebrate our 30th anniversary as a chapterin the coming year. When the Piedmont Chapter was formed on February 22, 1994, chapters in the SAR created a physical scrapbook each year to document the activities of the chapter and capture the impact the chapter had in the community around us. As our chapter historian, Ron Redner is now the keeper of these historical chapter scrapbooks. Can you imagine the stories these scrapbooks could tell if they could talk? There is beauty in holding a physical history in your hands and seeing the stories it tells.

Today, chapters in the SAR don't create scrap-books to tell their stories. We track our activities in spreadsheets. Yes, cold, hard, number-filled digital pieces of technology. Spreadsheets certainly aren't as elegant or artful as our scrapbooks once were. How often have you told someone, "Let me show you my spreadsheet?" Even though the numbers in our spreadsheets don't have the visual impact the scrapbooks once did, the spreadsheets do still tell a story about our SAR chapters.

Each year, we submit two key spreadsheets to tell our story, the Americanism Spreadsheet, and the Stark Report. Combined, these two spreadsheets capture how well we've helped support the mission of the SAR. Just by looking at the numbers, the Piedmont Chapter had a very good 2023 with over 16,000 Americanism points and over 15,000 Stark points. But the numbers don't really matter, they are simply an outcome. What matters is the impact we had in 2023 in our community sharing the activities building toward the 250th Anniversary of our nation, helping foster better understanding of history in students, and support of women veterans. That's what really matters.

Don't get me wrong. I'd be thrilled to have great report cards in 2024 too but only because those numbers would mean we had significant impact again. And even better, that would mean that we did it together working on delivering the mission of the SAR. Won't you be a part of writing our story in the new year? I look forward to it.

NOV Meeting Highlights

Piedmont Chapter Meeting - Roswell, GA

NOV 18th, 2023

The Regular Chapter Meeting of the Piedmont Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution was held in a hybrid format on Saturday, November 18, 2023. Members and interested parties were able to attend either in person at the Roswell Area Park Community Center or via zoom technology. President **Stacey McCarver** called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m.



President McCarver recognized the following guests and zoom attendees: **Stephen Heard**, dual member **Bill Simpson**, who was attending via zoom from his home in Utah, daughter of past President **Al Finley** and the Chapter's invited speaker, **Dr. Sonya Finley**, and past NSSAR President **Larry Guzy**, who also served as a past President of the Piedmont Chapter.

Dr. Finley, Col. U.S. Army (Ret.), who appeared via zoom. In addition to her PhD, Dr. Finley also earned a Master's degree at Cornell and an undergraduate degree at Emory. She has taught at West Point, and served in Korea, Iraq and the Pentagon. She now teaches at the National War College in Washington, D.C. Dr. Finley spoke about to-

day's military, "An Agile Force for Our Uncertain Today and Tomorrow." Today's military, including all branches, reservists and the National Guard, totals about 2.7 million members. They address overt threats, such as support for Ukraine, which was recently invaded by Russia, as well as covert threats such as from China, which seeks to dominate world markets, and



does not recognize any normal standards with respect to other countries' intellectual property and technology. We have formal treaty alliances with NATO, Japan, South Korea, Australia/New Zealand, the Phillipines and other Southeast Asian nations, including Taiwan. In the Middle East, we seek to deter Iranian backed terrorism. In short, our forces have to be agile and deployed around the world.

President McCarver recognized the Chapter's veterans who had served in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Sea-

bees and Marine Corps. Chapter member who served in the different branches include: (a) Army: Sonya Finley, Glenn Kirk, John Mortison, Bob Shaw, Bob Sapp (Army Air Corps), George Thurmond; (b) Navy: Jerry Breed, Larry Guzy, Ed Klaas, John Wassell; (c) Seabees: Bill Lusk; (d) Air Force: Paul Prescott; (e) Marines: Rick Reese, Jr.

As each branch's marching song was played, the members who had served in that branch rose and were warmly applauded by all of those present.



Chapter Awards: 133rd Congress: President McCarver reported that the Chapter received the "Partners in Patriotism Award" from NSSAR for Chapter Outreach: 2022-2023. He also recognized two Chapter members who received the Liberty Medal Award at Congress: (a) George Thurmond for outstanding service in the recruitment of new members and (b) Jaime Ruff for continued outstanding service in the recruitment of new members.

THE LIBERTY TREE

AMERICA 250 IS A MULTIYEAR EFFORT TO COMMEMORATE THE SEMIQUINCENTENNIAL OF THE UNITED STATES

Our Nations 250th Birthday is July 4th 2026. Throughout the next three years we will join the rest of the National Society in celebration of America's 250th Anniversary with patriotic, historical, and educational programs.

One of the ways The Piedmont Chapter is participating in the Liberty Tree program, is we are planting elm trees throughout the community with a focus on Schools, City Halls, and Public Spaces in commemoration of the Original Liberty Tree in Boston Common (1646-1775).

The original was a famous elm tree that stood in Boston, Massachusetts near Boston Common in the years before the American Revolution. In 1765, Patriots in Boston staged the first act of defiance against the British government at the tree. The tree became a rallying point for the growing resistance to the rule of Britain over the American colonies, and the ground surrounding it became known as Liberty Hall. The Liberty Tree was felled in August 1775 by Loyalists.

This elm is reputed to be resistant to Dutch Elm disease and is one of the varieties promising to return the American Elm to our landscapes. 

VETERANS Day Activities NOV, 11th 2023 Piedmont chapter members participate in ceremonies around the area



FLAG RESPECT CERTIFICATES



Craig Benton serves as the Flag Respect Chairman for our chapter, continuing Piedmont's rich tradition of honoring community members—whether governmental, commercial, or private—who proudly display our nation's flag. When we identify a deserving recipient, we present them with a certificate and photo opportunity. This not only enhances our chapter's visibility but also fosters patriotism and educates the public, a mission that gains significance as we approach the 250th anniversary of our country's birth.

The Flag Certificate is a prestigious acknowledgment reserved for those individuals, schools, companies, and government agencies that adhere to proper flag-flying etiquette. Compatriot Benton is enthusiastically dedicated to presenting as

many certificates as possi-

ble in the upcoming year. However, he requires our collective assistance. If you encounter or are aware of a flag being properly flown, please share the information with Craig, enabling him to extend our chapter's recognition.

United States Flag Protocol

- It is the universal custom to display the Flag only from sunrise to sunset on stationary flag staffs in the open. However, when a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may be displayed 24 hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness. The Flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously.
- The Flag, when carried in a procession with another flag or flags, should be either on the marching right, that is, the Flags own right, or, if there is a line of other flags, in front of the center of the line.
- The Flag should not be displayed on a float in parade except from a staff.
- No other Flag or pennant should be placed above or, if on the same level, to the right of the Flag of the United States of America, except during church services conducted by naval chaplains at sea, when the church pennant may be flown above the Flag during church services for the personnel of the Navy.
- When displayed either horizontally or vertically against a wall, the union should be uppermost and to the Flag's own right, that is, to the observer's left. When displayed in a window, the Flag should be displayed in the same way, with the union or blue field to the left of the observer in the street.
- When the Flag is displayed over the middle of the street, it should be suspended vertically with the union to the north in an east and west street, or to the east in a north and south street.
- When used on a speaker's platform, the Flag, if displayed flat, should be displayed above and behind the speaker. When displayed from a staff in a church or public auditorium, the Flag of the United States should hold the position of superior prominence, in advance of the audience, and in the position of honor at the clergyman's or speaker's right as he faces the audience. Any other flag so displayed should be placed on the left of the clergyman or speaker or to the right of the audience.

SAR Vigil at George Washington's Tomb



Washington's beloved Mount Vernon estate lies the final resting place of the nation's first president. George Washington's Tomb, a historic site of immense significance, holds a rich history spanning centuries. After Washington's death in 1799, he was initially interred in the family vault on the estate. The humble brick structure served as a temporary resting place while a more fitting memorial could be constructed.

In 1831, nearly 30 years after his death, a grander tomb was built to honor Washing-

ton's memory. A circular sandstone structure known as the Old Tomb was constructed to house his remains, offering a dignified space that befit the stature of the Founding Father. This tomb became a revered pilgrimage site, drawing visitors eager to pay their respects to the revered leader.



However, the saga of Washington's final resting place didn't end there. In 1837, the decision was made to construct an even grander tomb, the New Tomb, which remains the site of his final interment today. The move was not without controversy, as some feared the disturbance of Washington's eternal rest. Nevertheless, with meticulous care, Washington's body was transferred to its new resting place in a

marble sarcophagus, where it remains an enduring symbol

of the nation's gratitude for the sacrifices made by its founding figure.

In addition to George Washington himself, the tomb initially contained the remains of Martha Washington, his wife, who died in 1802. The bodies of other family members, including stepchildren and grandchildren, were also interred further back in the tomb.

Chapter. In 2 or 4 man 15 minute shifts, the SAR Color Guard stood honor guard positions at George and Martha Washington's Tomb at Mount Vernon. The Color Guard mustered at 7:45, marched to the house for a photo at 8:30 and then proceeded to the Tomb for the day. We provided guards from 9am to 4pm. During the daily Mount Vernon Wreath Laying Ceremony, a member of the SAR Color Guard led the Pledge of Allegiance while Commander Collins emceed the ceremony.

The Tomb Vigil is timed to coincide with the annual Mount Vernon Colonial Faire and crowds were large. We had many spectators during the 28 shift changes throughout the day. **Commander Collins** delivered a short speech at each shift change. Guardsmen that participate in the Tomb Vigil receive a Washington Tomb Guard lapel pin and also credit for their 250th Anniversary medals.

The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) invites all Eagle Scouts interested in the American Revolution to participate in the Arthur M. & Berdena King Eagle Scout Contest. The contest is open to all Eagle Scouts who are currently registered in an active unit and, except as provided in the paragraph below, have not reached their nineteenth birthday during the year of application. The year that the Eagle rank was awarded is not restricted. Contest year is Jan 1 to Dec 31.

The competition is conducted in three phases: the local Chapter level, State Society level, and National level. The competition is usually entered at the Chapter level, though in some cases, the competition may be entered at the State Society level. Applicants may not enter at the National level. Contest entrants need complete only one application for the SAR Chapter level competition.
